LIFTS WAR LIQUOR EMBARGO

Governor Allows the New Rochelle Saloons to Open.

ALBANY, Jan. 31.—With the approval of Governor Whitman, Commissioner Herbert S. Sloss lifted the embargo which since last year has prevented the sale of liquor in New Rochelle. The embargo was revoked on the grounds that the emergency which led to the embargo no longer existed.
At the time the embargo was established approximately 3,000 recruits for the United States naval and military services were billeted in the city owing to overcrowding at Fort Stocum, their point of destination.

...the wounded was hit by a sniper's bullet. He fell in a trench filled with water and almost drowned before he was rescued by his Captain.
Three men were killed by one shell which fell in a trench and another died of wounds in a hospital. Quite a few men have been sent to hospitals, wounded in the upper part of the body or on the head from shrapnel.
One man was blown to pieces by a shell in a regimental headquarters town as he was following his Colonel into a dugout.
All the dead were buried within sound and range of the guns.
For military reasons it has been inadvisable to send farther or other details.
